Tri City Flyers, Inc. Meeting Minutes, October 12, 2023

President Ed Valls called the meeting to order at 7:00 PM. 24 members were present.

Minutes to Last Meeting: No changes were requested. The minutes were approved as printed in the September newsletter.

Guests/New Members: There were no new members or guests present.

Treasurer's Report: Michael Zachau reported on the monthly deposits, expenses, and ending balances for our club's financial accounts. The report was received as presented.

# Safety Officers' Reports:

**Seguin** - There was nothing new to report. **Kingsbury** -There was nothing new to report.

Field Manager's Report: Gil Martinez reported that the field was in good condition. Due to the dry weather conditions no recent mowing has been required.

AMA Business: An update on our club's FAA Recognized Identification Areas (FRIA) was provided. Frank George stated that the AMA has provided some FRIA updates in their email newsletters. Rusty Koehler stated that as previously announced the FRIA application for our Kingsbury field has been approved by the FAA. Rusty stated that the AMA submitted our club's Seguin field FRIA application to the FAA for approval on September 18, 2023. A FRIA update for the Sequin field application will be provided when the AMA receives the FAA's response. On another AMA related topic Frank George stated that our club received a letter of appreciation for promoting our hobby and a \$75 check from the AMA, for the static display that our club provided at the Stinson Airport during an airshow fund raiser earlier this year.

Show and Tell: we only had one item this month. Thanks to Augie Jr for bringing in his Orion precision aerobatics model.



The Orion, designed by famous aerobatics competitor and designer Ed Kazmirski, made its appearance in 1960. The design was a significant departure from traditional "pattern" models of the day. He participated in the International FAI Championship competition, which he won with the first American team to participate in that competition. That win plus other attention his design garnered, cemented his design concept of an aerodynamically clean airplane with a relatively short nose and long tail moments as the design to beat, for many years. He continued refining his aerobatic plane design resulting in the even more famous Taurus. Later he designed a high wing trainer named Tauri. All three designs were kitted by Top Flite and in production for many years. Just as an interesting note Kazmirski won most of his



competitions flying precision aerodynamics with Reed type RC control. Read the complete biography at https://www.modelaircraft.org/sites/default/files/ files/KazmirskiEdwardJEd.pdf.

The final club activity I want to call your attention to is the PFM event on November 11. We have provided a static display of RC models in support of their event for a number of years. I know it is an effort to bring models out and take them home without getting them in the air. However, it is a part of our responsibility as an AMA chartered club to promote the hobby. As noted in the Minutes, we recently received a cash award from the AMA for supporting a Commemorative Air Force Fund Raiser at Stinson Airport.

It is also an opportunity to offer our support to our neighbors at Kingsbury. It will be a little easier this year since we can bring things to Kingsbury early Saturday instead of Friday. Please consider cleaning up a couple of your nicer models and bring them out to show them off with others. The current plan is to have all models in our display area by 8:30 AM, then park, and setup models and the display. The event officially starts at 9:00 AM, but past experience says not many visitors show up that early.

There was only one show and tell this month. Don't be shy about bringing something to share with the club members. It doesn't have to be a model. Some have shown us engines, useful tools they have found, different kinds of model stands and other types of support equipment.

I will end by sharing a work in progress in my shop. I have been working on this big J-3 Cub off and on, it seems like forever. The picture also shows my shop is a work in progress as well. This is an old



Great Planes 60 size kit, and with a 90 inch wing span the Cub is 1/4.7 scale. It is old enough to have die cut parts rather than laser cut. Many online comments complain about the finished weight. That is very understandable because my kit has many parts made from dense, heavy balsa rather than top grade. They are also, in my opinion, over designed for a model intended for scale flight. For example, the tail surfaces were designed to be 5/16 inch thick, and the die cut outline parts were much beefier than needed. By block sanding all parts to 1/4 inch and trimming the outline with my Dremel sander, I reduced the total tail surface weight by 18%. In addition, all 3/16 sheet parts have received lightening holes, consistent with expected load distribution. Oh yes, the original one-piece wing design was modified to two panels. She is finally about ready for final sanding and covering.
